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STUDENT AND STAFF INFO

The UCT Knowledge Co-op acts as a gateway for external constituencies to access the resources and expertise within the University to address challenges they face.



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The UCT Knowledge Co-op encourages collaborative research projects. Where possible, it brings together a community partner with suitable disciplines and facilitates the development and successful completion of projects. Students, supervised by academic staff – or staff members themselves – may take on projects. In each project, the work they do will benefit the community partners and also contribute to their academic requirements.



The process

- Community groups submit ideas to the UCT Knowledge Co-op.
- The Co-op matches these to relevant academics and/or students.

Depending on the topic it may:

- become the topic for a thesis at honours or masters level;
- develop into a research theme for staff;
- give rise to a number of research projects involving different researchers and disciplines;
- offer a service learning or community service opportunity.

Mutual Benefits

This process is a developmental experience for all parties. The Co-op aims to ensure that the collaborations benefit everyone involved in the projects we facilitate.

- **Community partners** receive research or practical support for their work.
- **Participating students:**
 - gain experience working with a community group;
 - receive preparation for and support in this experience;
 - have easy access to informants and community expertise on the issue;
 - will be able to show that they have carried out research for a real client.
- **Academics** may expand their network of partners for socially responsive research and/or teaching.

Some FAQs

Will the project form all – or only part of – my thesis?

The project ideas – or part of them – will become your thesis topic. The scope of the topic will be clarified in consultation with your academic supervisor and the community partner.

How long does it take to complete a project?

This depends on the type of project and research that you are conducting. As a rule you will produce your dissertation within the normal time frame.

How are students' chosen to get involved in projects?

Students choose topics they are interested in. Both their supervisor and the community partner need to agree that their proposal is fitting.
